| ANECDOTES <br> Just two TRUE stories from Hymie Zolkwer, our 90-odd year old Whitefield area bridge player...When selected for a match, he commented cynically.... "I know how these selection decisions work...first you choose on ability, then on availability, and finally alphabetically!" | After a lot of persuasion, Hymie had agreed to play transfers over 1NT with Jack Samuels. So Jack opened 1NT, and Hymie bid $2 \boldsymbol{A}$. Jack alerted and thinking it was a minor transfer, bid 2NT with a good hand and both minors. Now Hymie bid 34, which Jack passed...just making. At the end of the hand, Jack asked Hymie what exactly was he doing since they had agreed to play transfers. Hymie replied " $2 *$ is a transfer to Hearts, $2 \vee$ means I want you to play in Spades, 2^ means I want to play it!" |

E should realise that to justify 5NT W must have $\triangle A Q$ so with a $7^{\text {th }} \wedge$ he should bid $7 \wedge$. There is even a case for this over 5NT rather than showing the $\mathrm{K} v$ by the $6 \vee$ bid.
Against this W may not have the $\vee$ Q. His bidding suggests he was looking for the $\div \mathrm{K}$. The grand is trivial as the $\square J$ is singleton so you can ruff $\uparrow 4$ with $\wedge$ Q. Otherwise you combine chances of ruffing out the $\approx \mathrm{K}$ - it came down in 3 or a double-squeeze using the $\vee \& *$ threats and as the anchor suit. Pity it was not $\star$ A.

A $4 v / a$ should be a fit-jump but could be misread as splinter so I picked 3, to show a good raise in \%. I don't think W should $X$ the $4 \boldsymbol{a}$ bid as he should work out $E$ is short in $\uparrow$ and should have some good $\vee$ and * values. E should pull to 5 * then W may bid $6 \%$. Getting to $7 *$ is very hard.

You can later use $\diamond J$ and $\approx A$ to finesse W twice to pick up his $\vee \mathrm{K}$. Its very difficult to find this line as your also need a 2-2 * split. I sat N and W opened $1 \&$. I overcalled 1 NT and this was passed round to opener. At our table opener doubled - this was passed out and on $\& 10$ lead resulted in 3
vulnerable overtricks for +780 . That was 1 IMP out when team-mate also reopened with a double and East struggled in 2a doubled for -800 ! I think the W hand is too flat for reopening and both W players got their just desert on the hand.
One player had an unlucky playing decision in this slam.


How do you play $6 \checkmark$ on $\mathrm{a} \div$ lead to the $\approx \mathrm{A}$ and a switch? At the table, declarer played A (wouldn't you?), drew trumps with $\vee A Q$ in 2 rounds, then played $\triangle A K$, ruff a $\uparrow$. Unlucky! $N$ held $A$ Q10xx so there were only 3 - discards and declarer was even more miffed at the end to find $S$ with the $\nabla$ !
