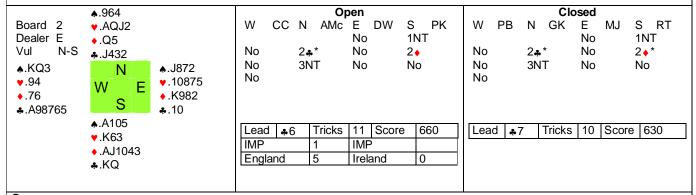


Don't quite see how W was expecting to defeat 5. .

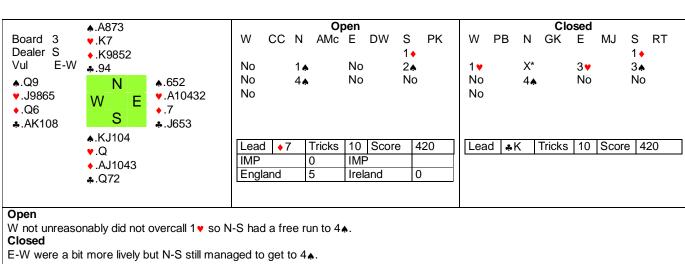
Both rooms managed to use the entries to dummy to ruff out the ♣K – setting up the ♣Q to provide a discard for a ♥ loser.



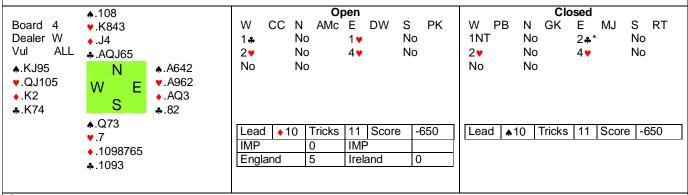

Closed

Fairly routine board − S won ♣Q, crossed to ♥J to lead ♦Q. Later E switched to a ♠ when he won the ♦8 so S could only take 10 tricks.



Both rooms managed to find the AQ.

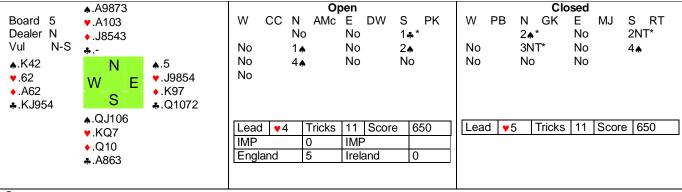


Open

As E-W were playing a Strong-1NT it meant that 4♥ was played by E. The ♣10 lead would have had E sweating a little.

Closed

The Weak-1NT opener led to W playing 4♥ so the ♣K was protected. The ♠10 lead also helped to find the ♠Q.



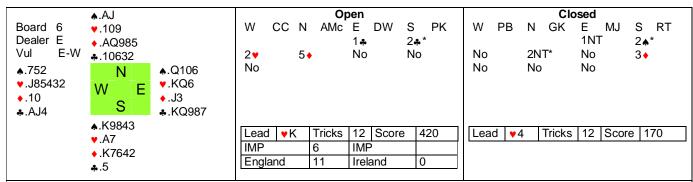

2 (Tartan) led to a routine 4.

Closed

A Strong-* auction led to the same contract.

No problems in the play just losing 2 ◆ tricks.



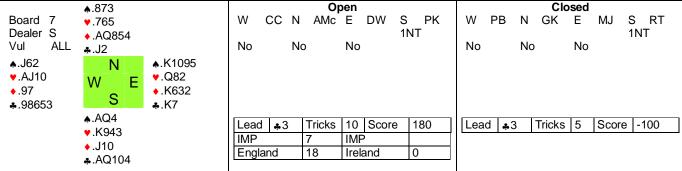
The 2♣ cue-bid showed 5-5 ♠ + ♦ so N had a clear game-call.

Closed

The 2♠ bid showed ♠ + another suit. 2NT enquired and 3♦ showed ♦. N took a dim view to pass.

Both rooms managed to ruff out the ♠ to establish a discard of the ♥10 loser.

Is this a slam that should have been bid we all ask?



It looks like either E put up the ♣K to make the ♣J an entry or took the ◆J allowing S to then make 4 ◆ tricks and later take the ♠K finesse for 10.

Closed

This time E did manage to keep S away from his long ◆ tricks and so held S to 5 tricks.



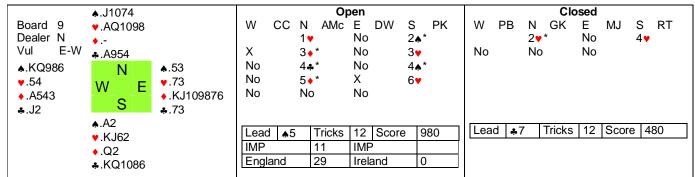

After the 2♥-WJO E makes a T/O-X for E-W to reach 4.

Closed

Over 1NT, 2 ♦ was either transfer to 2 ♥ or a single-suited overcall. The jump to 3 ♠ was natural and forcing. With a minimum hand W simply bid 4 ♠ to end the auction.

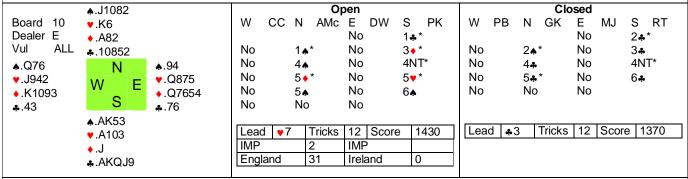
No problem in the play – simply ruff out the ♣ after drawing 1 round of ♠.



The 2♠ response was Jacoby. 3♦ showed shortage then 3♥ showed a balanced hand with mild slam interest. 4♣ and 4♠ were cuebids then 5♦ confirmed a void so S had lots of good cards now to bid 6♥.

2♥ was Reverse-Flannery. You can't blame S for just bidding 4♥ as he does not expect his partner to have a ♦ void. No problem in the play as there are 12 easy tricks – just a ♠ loser. Interesting point is that 7♣ is solid for N-S.



Open

After the Strong-♣, 1♠ showed a balanced response and 3♦ a 3 suiter with short ♦. N tried to close proceedings with 4♠ but S has plenty to bid 4NT – RKCB. 5♦ showed 1 control and 5♥ asked about the ♠Q. 5♠ denied the ♠Q so S settled for 6♠.


After the Strong-2*, 2* showed a balanced positive then a natural raise of 3* led to 6*. Both rooms had just the *Q to lose.

1NT was Strong. N did well to keep out of the auction. 2♣ was an enquiry and 3♥ showed a maximum with 5 ♥ - leading to 3NT. Win ♣A and take ♦K finesse then ♥5 towards ♥Q leads to an easy 9 or 10 tricks.

Closed

After 1 ♥ you can't blame N for 2♣ but it leads to disaster. E passes in the modern style and then passes the re-opening T/O-X. S rescues to 2♠ and then E-W do well to also axe that. The ♥A was led then ♥5 for E to ruff with ♠10. ♦3 to ♦9 and ♦J. ♥6, ♦6 from N ruffed with ♠J. At this point E might have led ♠K but played another ♦ to ♦K and ♦A. W might have also now under-led ♠A but played ♠A to crash E - ♠K. W then had to lead ♠9 to protect his winners so only down 4 for 800.

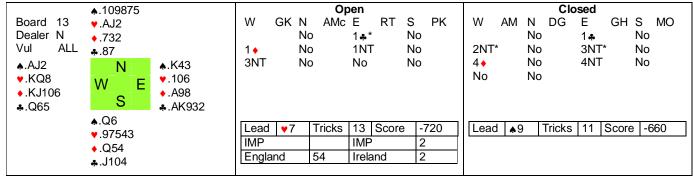


Open

After 2♠ (Tartan) and 3♦ - To Play S has to risk 3NT as X would more normally be T/O. On the bidding it is very difficult for W to find the killing ♥ lead so 3NT becomes easy.

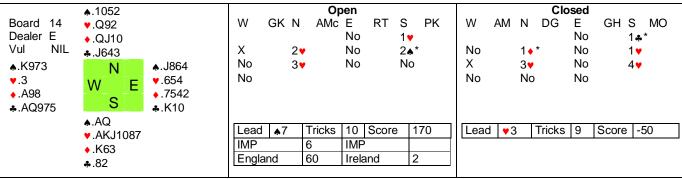
This time S makes a T/O-X of 1♥ so 3NT will never make as E has got the required lead mentioned. I think N should bid 1NT over 1♠ - rather than X (shows 4♠). S choice of 3♣ looks bizarre when he had either Pass or X – presumably penalty available after 2♦ by E. W led ♥5 to ♥K then ♠4 switch to ♠A and ♥4 back to ♥A. E gave W a ♦ ruff, W gave E a ♠ ruff and E gave W another ♦ ruff. W still had to come to 2 more ♣ tricks for 3 down.



S found the best lead but it led to many overtricks when N ducked the ♥Q. E now finessed S for the ◆Q to protect the ♥K and when the minor winners were cashed N was squeezed in the majors for 13.


2NT was Baron over 1♣ (16+ balanced) but with no fit and a combined minimum E-W stopped in 4NT. W did not pick up the ◆Q so only made 11.



Open

1 v showed 5 so N raised to 2 v. 2 h was probably a Romex trial bid – i.e. asking for help elsewhere so N declined with 3 v. Closed

After the Strong-♣ N-S got to 4♥ and the spotlight was on W who managed to find the safe ♥ lead. As the ♥ and ♦ were played by S, E showed some interest in the ♣ suit so eventually E-W came to 4 tricks.

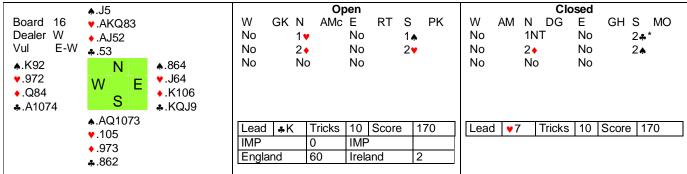


Open

A simple 1♠ overcall followed by a Sputnik-X by E and a 2♠ 2-Way-Cue-bid by S led to 4♠ by N.

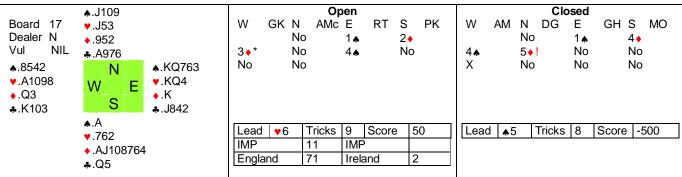
1NT led to a conservative 2♠ overcall by N. S managed to raise so 4♠ was also reached. Routine 10 tricks.



2 by N should only make 9 tricks as long as W holds up the ♠K.


2♠ by S has more chance of making 10 tricks. Once again, W did not hold up the ♠K so S could draw trumps and cash 6 winners in dummy.



Open

The 3♦ cue-bid showed a full raise to 3♠ so E raised to 4♠. E was not clairvoyant so lost 2♠ and 2 minor aces. Closed

S made a rather meaty 4♦ pre-empt over 1♠. All would have been well if N had passed 4♠. W did well to find the axe. E-W took their 3 ♥ tricks, 1 ♦ trick and a ♣ trick for 3 down.

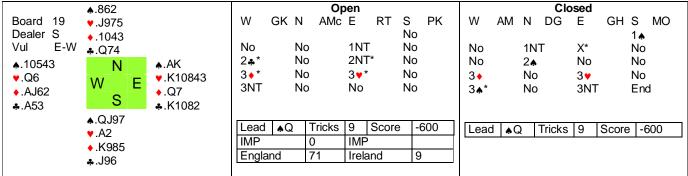


Open

On this lively board W make a T/O-X of 1♠ and N barraged to 3♠. S showed some slam interest with 4♥ so W bid 5♣ and later made a high card penalty-X of the 5♠ save. E-W came to the obvious 3 tricks.

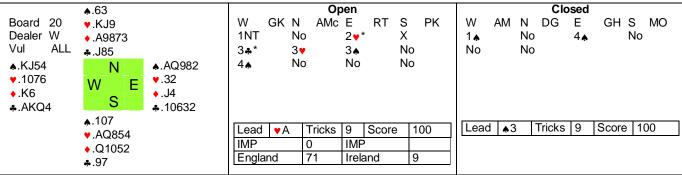
Closed

S was more aggressive over 1♣ and it looks like W has taken the right action to bid 6♣. E had a look of doom on his face when he discovered the 4-0 ◆ split – 1 down.



1NT was strong and 2NT over 2♣ showed a medium strength with a 5 major. 3♦ asked for more information leading to 3NT. Closed

The light 1 \spadesuit and even lighter 1NT response nearly worked as E-W had to get their act together to reach 3NT. E won \spadesuit Q with \spadesuit A and set about \blacktriangledown nearly worked continued with \spadesuit 9 on winning \blacktriangledown A. E now cleared the \blacktriangledown to N - \blacktriangledown J and won \clubsuit A return to simply duck \spadesuit to \spadesuit Q. S gave up just cashing the \spadesuit J for 9 tricks.

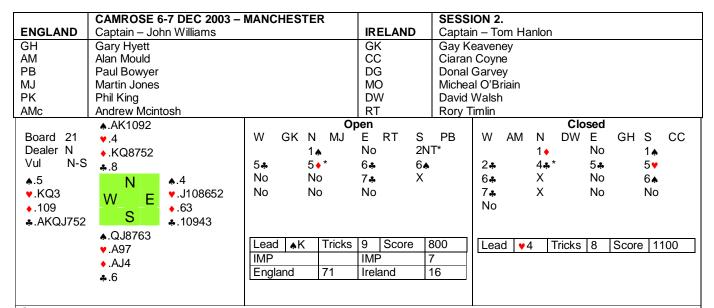

A routine transfer sequence – broken to 4♠. The 3♥ bid from N helped S to lead the ♥A. After 3 rounds of ♥ they could then sit back and wait for 2 ♦ tricks – 1 down.

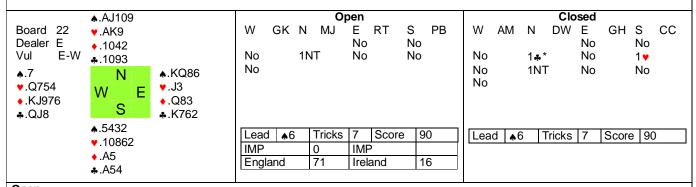
1♠ by W was raised to 4♠ by E. N found a safe ♠ lead. After trumps were drawn and 3♣ tricks cashed W exited with a ♥. N-S should have played 3 rounds for W to then open up ♦. In practice S won the 2nd round of ♥ and led the ♦ 2. This is a Grovesnor Coup as it gives W a losing option as he would have to lead towards the ♦ K if left to his own devices. Not unreasonably, W put up the ♦ K for 1 down.



2NT was Jacoby showing a good raise to 4♠ or more. After 5♣, 5♦ showed a non-minimum 2-suiter. E saved in 6♣, S bid 6♠ and E saved in 7♣. S double showed a ♣ loser. A trick was lost in the defence as N did not get a ♥ ruff.

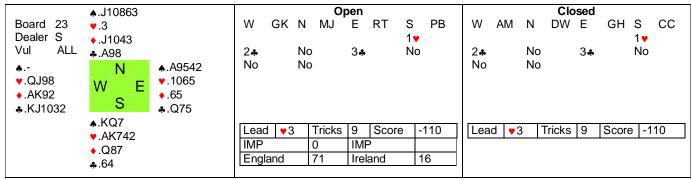
1 ◆ by N led to a slower auction but both sides knew that it was right to save in 7 ♣ and also to double 7 ♣. The difference was that N-S took their top tricks and also got the ♥ ruff.

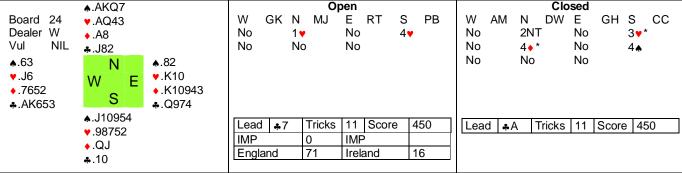
1NT was passed out and E made the unfortunate ♠6 lead. N could now develop a 3 trick in ♥ by playing ♥AK then ♥9 – 7 tricks. Closed

The prepared 1♣ opener led to a 1NT re-bid (Weak). The same ♠ lead and ♥ play led to a flat board.



Closed

Nothing special on this hand. Both rooms overcalled 2. N decided not to make a thin Sputnik-X and E raised to 3. - 9 tricks.

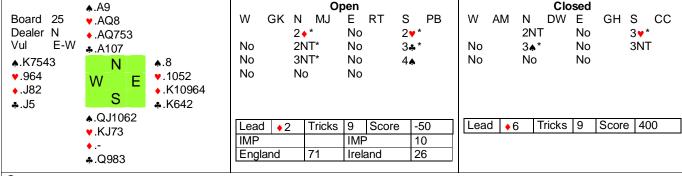
N could not open 2NT – or chose not to and knew what to expect from a 4♥ raise so passed.

W did not find the ◆ switch on winning the ♣K so 11 tricks were made.

Closed

N did open 2NT and broke the transfer to 3♠ to 4♦. S now had to play 4♠.

After cashing the ♣A it is not clear if the ♣ are 4-1 or 3-2 so W tried to cash the ♣K - 11 tricks for a flat board.

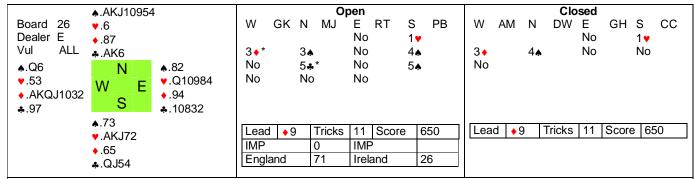


Open

The Multi-2 was used to show a 2Nt opener. The 3NT response to 3♣ (5 card Puppet Stayman) was supposed to show 3♠ so S bid 4♠. I don't quite know how S went down. W has found the best lead but it does not look like W can make more than the ♠K and a long ♠ while E comes to the ♣K.

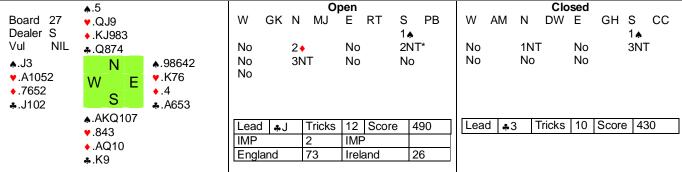

With plenty of points S just investigated a possible ♠ fit before bidding 3NT - this has an easy 9 tricks.



W made a sound pre-emptive 3♦ overcall and N bid 3♠ - raised to 4♠. N made one more try but passed 5♠ when S could not show a • control. He was lucky the ♠Q was right otherwise • AK and another • would have promoted ♠Qx offside for 1 down.

N chose a quicker route to 4 so could not go down at the 5 level.

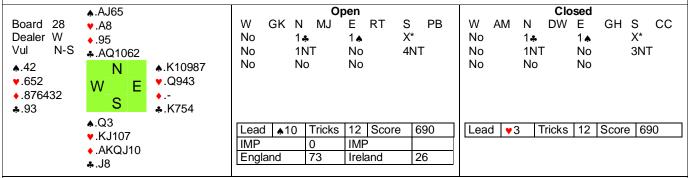


Open

The 2NT re-bid was game-forcing after the 2♦ response. On this occasion the ♣J was the wrong lead as S could now develop 3 ♣ tricks + 5 ♦ and 4 ♠ for 12.

Closed

On the \$3 lead S could only cash his top tricks so came to 10 tricks when the \$J dropped.

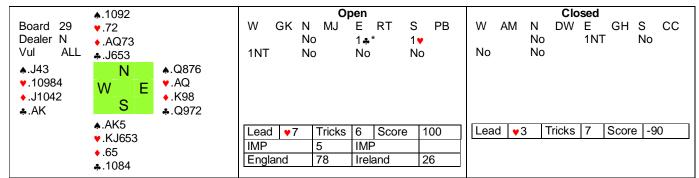


Open

For whatever reason S decided to make a Sputnik-X of the 1♠ overcall to investigate a ♥ fit rather than bidding a natural 2♦. He did at least make a quantitative raise to 4NT. Either N should have accepted because of his 5th ♣ or S should have bid 6NT.

Closed N-S never got near the slam.

It is vital that N plays 6NT. E has to find a safe lead and that is the *4. He can also get off lead with the *7 when he wins the *K. N can now cash the * and • winners to squeeze E in the majors for 12 tricks.

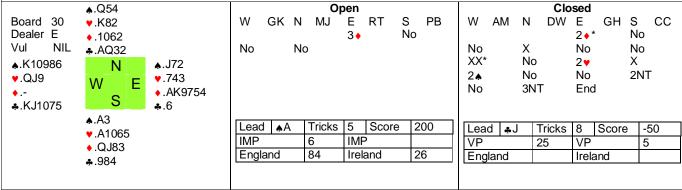


It would have been better to lie a little a make a Sputnik-X of 1 v so that E can bid 1 ♠ or 1NT if he did not have 4 ♠.

The ▼7 lead gave a tempo to N-S although it looks like E-W can come to 7 tricks with the right views.

Closed

The ♥3 into the ♥AQ made it easier for E in 1NT. He crossed to the ♣K to play towards the ♦K98 to make an easy 7.



Open

The aggressive 3♦ pre-empt came at the wrong moment. Neither S or N could enter the bidding so just took 2 down.

Closed

The more normal Weak-2 led to a lively auction. A double of the 2 rescue would have collected 1-2 down on the best defence of ♣4 to ♣A and the ♣3 return. The choice of 2NT by S was sound but N should have passed. If S had any more he would have bid 3 or 3 or even 3NT so N has no reason to raise 2NT to 3NT.

S could only develop 8 tricks as W cleared the ♣ stop when he got in with the ♠K and later has the vital ♥ entry so S cannot duck a ♥.
