You are in 3NT and get a low & lead to the ♣Q on your right. This hand is from a recent Hubert Phillips match when you arrive in the wrong contract of 3NT after this sequence:

When dummy appears, you make a mental note to discuss that 3♦ bid of partner's later...but for the present you have to plan the best line for making 3NT. (Ed. What about the 3NT bid – surely 3♠ is right). Give it some thought before reading on...

Most players are technicians, looking for the best mathematical line, however, bridge is a practical game and often the psychological approach reaps more dividends. Having won the ♣A, the obvious line is to try ◆AK and if the ◆Q does not fall, then try the ♥K finesse hoping for it also dropping, with the ♠Q also in reserve. Some may also try the ♥Q at trick 2 and if it isn't covered, assume the ♥K is wrong and try to sniff out the ◆Q position.

I decided to go for a different chance. At trick 2, I crossed to the ◆K and ran ◆J losing to ◆Q on my left. The point here is that LHO knows I have &J(from his partner's play of &Q at trick 1) but has no way of knowing that it is unguarded and may well work out that conceding another . trick could be my 9th trick on the hand (along with 4♦, 2♠, ♥A and ♣A. After some though he switched to ♥8.

Is the ♥K likely to be right? Although, there is no certain indicator, I decided from his choice of a high ♥, the finesse was losing so won ♥A and cashed 3 more ♦. Although the selection of a high or low ♥ should have no relevance here. I think it is human nature for most players to still lead cards in the natural way. On the ◆ LHO threw a ♣ and ♠2. I now played ♠K and small ♠, LHO following with ♠8 and ♠10 to reach the critical moment – finesse or drop the ♠Q?

What would you do? Once again, you need to analyse your opponent's mind and work out how likely he was to throw the ♠2 from ▲1082 or ▲Q1082. Perhaps it was just luck or maybe that table presence again but I got it right - dropping ♠Q offside for a hardearned 50 points loss on the hand when opponents were in 4+2 in the other room.

There is no doubt that the psychological approach on many hands has its place and is a skill that I think can be developed by all players.

Once again the team that played had little resemblance to the original selection due to the unavailability of most of the pairs. Howard Kay did an excellent job in getting the team together. The venue was Manchester Bridge Club. There were 8 teams participating Manchester, Lancashire. Merseyside, Yorkshire, Derbyshire, North Wales, Cumbria and Mid-Wales. The format was an all-play-all with each team playing 14 boards against every other team with the total IMPs over each board finally converted to VPs using the 28 board scale.

I was very unhappy with both the TD (Dave Stevenson's) running of the event and the facilities provided at the Manchester BC. It really is impractical to host 16 tables in the downstairs room, and there was confusion throughout in where to move to, which boards to play (especially with both blue and yellow sets in play), which opponents were next etc.

Stevenson's direction seemed haphazard, On the summary below I have evaluated a with little preparation there were no comparison based on Butler scoring. It prepared movement cards and the running should however be noted that the pairs who score was scribbled on illegible bits of only played one day have a more limited paper - all in all very badly managed.

As to the bridge, I had little time to monitor our progress. The team seemed to play well without luck. Alan Jones came late on Sunday and we were fined 2 boards (6 IMPs). In addition, I was involved in an adverse ruling which cost us 14 IMPs as follows. At Green, holding:

Ax ♥ Kxxx ◆ Q ♣ QJxxxx

after three passes, you open 1. (perhaps unwisely). LHO bids 2♣ (showing ♠ + ◆) and partner doubles (showing values with possible willingness to double one of their suits). RHO bids 3. which is passed round to partner who doubles. What do you do? With such a poor hand, and given RHO's unforced jump bid, I bid 3♥ this floated one off. Unfortunately, Mark had made the second double after some thought and the result was ruled back to 3 → -X+1. I did not appeal the ruling.

Dave Debbage & Mike Newman were somewhat unlucky bidding two slams both going down on an unlucky 4-1 trump break.


